A wonderful example of this value in action took place at our Silverwood Sixth Form Coffee Shop.


Students from both our Chippenham and Rowde campuses came together to welcome visitors with warmth and respect.

I am honoured to be writing to you as a Governor of Silverwood School, especially as someone who has had a long-standing connection with this wonderful school.



### **Chippenham Campus**







Term 5 has been a busy and exciting time for everyone at Chippenham Campus, filled with a wide range of activities, learning opportunities, and memorable moments.

This term, we have been thinking about William Shakespeare and the pupils have been learning about The Tempest.

As part of their learning some children created the beach from the play and explored the sand and made sand pictures. This hands-on activity not only helped bring the play to life, but it also allowed the pupils to engage with the story in a creative and tactile way.

Others experienced a 'sensory storm,' where they were able to engage with the sounds, textures, and sights inspired by The Tempest. This immersive activity allowed pupils to explore the play in a completely new way,

Classes have been exploring the shopping topic through role play activities and becoming familiar with what different types of money looks like. Some children visited the market and garden centre set up in school, where they had the chance to look for items on our shopping list. They practised putting items in our shopping basket and handling coins.

To support this learning, we have used different forms of Total Communication to make requests from various types of shops, including the music shop!

Some children have visited shops in our local community, giving them the chance to practice these skills in a real-life setting.

Yellowhammer have enjoyed doing art for VE Day, practicing scissor skills and motor skills through painting. The class has also been planting seeds and taking care of them, learning about what plants need to grow.

Skylark class has been learning about the different parts of plants and what they do. We even had a go at assembling a sunflower and planting our own!

Starling class has been busy making healthy snacks all term. The pupils enjoyed matching the fruits to their coreboards, and there were plenty of vocalisations throughout the activity.









### **Trowbridge Campus**



Term 5 at Trowbridge Campus has been busy and varied.

Doves have been showing an amazing awareness for our value Respect; they have been demonstrating this through interventions such as Chloe's farm, where the pupils are able to show how gently they handle the animals.

The Communication Bill of Rights sums up everything we strive to achieve at Silverwood. It is a tool that informs our pupils and supporting adults as to what and how communication should take place.



#### **Nut Free School**



This is a friendly reminder that if you are providing a snack for your child to bring into school, please remember that we are a **nut-free school**.

This policy is extremely important as we have pupils with nut allergies, and we need to ensure the safety of all children.

Please can we remind you that peanut butter and Nutella spread contain nuts, and we do not allow these foods in school due to our nut-free policy.

#### **Young Carers**

A Young Carer is a child under 18 who regularly helps care for a family member or friend with a disability, illness, mental health condition, or addiction problem.

At Silverwood, we are committed to supporting young carers. If you or a family member requires assistance, please don't hesitate to contact the school office or your child's teacher.

### Important information



#### Sarah and Clare's Law

**Sarah's Law** (the Child Sex Offender Disclosure Scheme) allows parents, carers, and guardians to request information from the police regarding whether someone has a criminal record for child sexual offences.

**Clare's Law** (the Domestic Violence Disclosure Scheme) gives individuals the right to know if their current or ex-partner has a history of violence or abuse.

#### **Unsanctioned and Unlicensed Treatments**

We have recently become aware of several companies, both abroad and within the UK, offering treatments that claim to "cure" conditions such as epilepsy and autism. These practices are unsanctioned, unlicensed, and can be harmful to a child's well-being and health.

If you are seeking help and support with your child's condition, we strongly advise that you consult the NHS and a paediatric consultant to ensure that any treatment is licensed, medically sound, and safe for your child.

Please note that the school is unable to authorise any unlicensed treatments, medications, or therapies. Given the potential risks involved, any such treatment would result in a welfare referral.



#### **Lockdown Procedures**

As part of the safety requirements for all schools, we now have a set of lockdown procedures in place. These procedures are designed to protect our pupils in the event of a threat from outside the school or the local community.

A lockdown is the opposite of a fire drill and would involve keeping children safe inside the building until the threat has passed.

As a special school, we benefit from being inside a secure building with additional security measures that have been specifically designed to ensure the safety of our children. Each class has a tailored lockdown procedure, considering their location, as well as the pupils' physical needs and cognitive abilities.


In the event of a lockdown at any of our sites, parents will be promptly informed and provided with further instructions via Seesaw and email.
